Koselleck, Reinhart. 2002. *The Practice of Conceptual History*. Stanford: Stanford University Press.

_____. 1985. *Futures Past: On the Semantics of Historical Time*. Cambridge: MIT Press.

A theorist of history, Koselleck examines the evolution of time as a category of practice and analysis. As Koselleck describes it, the experience of time varies over time and space, providing a theoretical opening for studying the meaning of past, present and future for historical actors.

Hoy, David. 2009. *The Time of Our Lives: A Critical History of Temporality*. Cambridge: MIT Press.

Hoy provides a phenomenological examination of time experience. The work surveys key philosophical interventions on the topic of temporality or the experience of time.

Fasolt, Constantin. 2004. *The Limits of History*. Chicago: University of Chicago Press.

Fasolt examines the possibilities and constraints of history. Focusing on the strong link between politics and history as a discipline. Fasolt searches for more expansive modes of conceptualizing and representing the past than what is typically found in recent historical practice.

Brubaker, Rogers and Frederick Cooper. 2000. "Beyond Identity." *Theory and Society* 29, 1-47.

Brubaker and Cooper survey the many meanings and uses of the term "identity" in contemporary scholarship. Given the new vocabulary surrounding enhancing life, the article is a useful reminder to maintain the distinction between categories of analysis and categories of practice.

Sewell, William. 2005. *Logics of History: Social Theory and Social Transformation*. Chicago: University of Chicago Press.

As a scholar who works at the boundaries between history and the social sciences, in this collection of essays Sewell theorizes the experience of historical time. His work is particularly relevant to the current project with its focus on temporality and future imaginaries.
